Mental Health

What's the Problem?

- In 2022, over 46,000 people contacted the 988 mental health emergency line in South Carolina
- Of those 127 people a day, only 55 received a response from someone in South Carolina
- Of the 72 people a day who do not receive an in-state response, 24 are youth and children
- Suicide is the #2 cause of death for youth & children in our State
- Every day, 2 people in South Carolina die from suicide

What's the Solution?

- These calls go unanswered because there is not funding in the State budget for the 988 call center run by Mental Health America of Greenville County
- To answer all these contacts, our local call center needs \$3.9 million in the 2023-24 State budget
- Right now, the State has a \$3.9 billion surplus
- Our local senator, Ross Turner, sits on the finance committee and has proposed \$3.9 million in the Senate's draft budget.
- However, the House's proposed budget has no money for the 988 call center in Greenville, which is currently the only one in the whole state
- Without this funding, over half of all incoming 988 contacts will receive no in-state response

What's our Ask?

- We are asking Bruce Bannister, the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and our local representative, to:
 - Support the Senate's proposed appropriation of \$3.9 million in the 2023-24 budget bill when it comes back to the House in May

Housing

What's the Problem?

- **30,000 households** in Greenville County are one paycheck away from homelessness because they cannot afford the cost of their home
- There is a shortage of at least **11,000 homes** for families making 30% of the area median income, about **\$27,000 a year**
- Rents in Greenville nearly doubled from 2021-22 and we have the 9th highest eviction rate in the entire country

What's the Solution?

- We need to build more homes at all income levels, especially for families making \$27,000 a year where the need is greatest.
- From our research, we have learned that the national best practice is to fund affordable housing with **dedicated annual revenue streams**.
- Greenville City has laid out plans to invest \$40 million into the Greenville Housing Fund over the next five years, and has already invested \$10.5 million since 2018, with a goal of producing 10,000 new homes by 2028
- Greenville County Council gave \$10 million in ARPA dollars to the Redevelopment Authority
- From conversations with the Greenville Housing Fund, we've learned that to build 10,000 homes by 2028 will require at least \$20MM every year

What's our Ask?

- We are asking Mayor White & Greenville City Council members to commit to:
 - Creating new dedicated revenue streams to accomplish a goal of \$10 million dollars annually to the Greenville Housing Fund.
 - Working to ensure that one third of funding from the city goes towards families making
 30% of the Area Median Income
- We are asking Greenville County Council members to commit to:
 - Creating new dedicated revenue streams to accomplish a goal of \$10 million dollars annually to the Greenville County Redevelopment Authority
 - Working to ensure that one third of funding from the county goes towards families making 30% of the Area Median Income
